What Do We Do?

Background

The Charity was founded on the 19th November 2003, specifically to help children and young people with physical disabilities, in Stourbridge and the surrounding areas, which for practical reasons we defined as being within a 50 mile radius of Stourbridge. The Charity Commission registered number is 1101230. The stated aim is: "The provision of financial assistance, at the discretion of the Trustees, to provide the relief of physically handicapped children. This includes improvement to the quality of life by the provision of financial or other assistance, or any other purpose the Trustees deem to be in accordance with the stated aim".

How we can help

We can provide the funding, or balance of funding, required for the purchase of mobility/sensory/vision equipment when the NHS Trusts/Families are unable to provide support. We aim to respond within 24 to 48 hours as we consider a rapid response is essential when children have degenerative or life limiting conditions. We operate with zero administration costs so that every penny donated goes to help those the donor intended to support. Typically we fund:

- Special exercise equipment, special exercise tricycles, walkers, and standing frames, to assist in regaining and maintaining mobility
- Wheelchairs, special mobility chairs, special car seats and safety harnesses, special seating, special beds, support and lifting equipment, sensory room equipment to improve the quality of life, and vision equipment to assist those with deteriorating eye conditions.

How we assess Grant Applications

Following an initial approach, we request the submission of a detailed grant application. In order to assess the position, we typically require the following:

- Background and reason for the request
- Supporting information from a relevant healthcare professional detailing the medical position and the advantages of the proposed equipment purchase
- A detailed quotation, following assessment by the supplier's competent person
- Details of any funding already raised, any other sources of funding, and a brief description of the financial position of the family

Provided that we are assured that our help will be for those in real need, the application is in accordance with our grant criteria, and we have the funding available, it will be considered for approval. Grants are normally funded by online payment directly to the supplier, to ensure that the funds are only used for the intended purpose. All remaining order and delivery arrangements are then left to the applicant, so that we are not involved in any administration costs.

Delight as charity past the £1M mark!



One of the West Midlands' leading charities for supporting children with physical disabilities is celebrating a major funding milestone with the help of a donation from Alloy Wire International.

The Chris Westwood Charity, which helps fund the purchase of mobility, sensory and vision equipment for children living within a 50-mile radius of Stourbridge, has become the latest beneficiary of our 'Wired for Good' campaign.

A £7,500 donation has taken the organisation's total fundraising to over £1 million since it was started by Chris Westwood 18 years ago, with all the proceeds going towards supporting 850 young people to live more independent lives.

Our money has already been allocated to four recipients, who will receive life-changing special car seats and special exercise trikes to help them in overcoming transportation issues and in building strength and stamina.

"We had supported the Chris Westwood Charity for Children with Physical Disabilities in 2018 and were really impressed with the fact that every penny donated goes towards the individuals who need it most," explained Mark Venables, Managing Director of Alloy Wire International. He continued: "The grants are quickly reviewed, and the money given direct to suppliers to help parents purchase vital equipment that will help their children live as independent a life as possible. It's even better news that our donation was the one that took Chris and the Trustees past the magical £1m mark; a truly fantastic achievement."

Chris Westwood, who has already pledged to leave his own estate to the charity, continued: "Support from companies like Alloy Wire International is crucial, especially following the recent pandemic and we're delighted that a Black Country firm's contribution has taken us past £1m raised since 2003.

"The next target is to raise another £1m and continue our work in helping children with physical disabilities."

Some Examples of Equipment Funded

Special Exercise Trikes: These are usually proposed to try to build leg and trunk strength, improve co-ordination and help mobility. They are particularly important where the child has a diagnosis of Cerebral Palsy as use of a trike helps with the required leg muscle stretching exercises that are regularly needed.

The decision on the equipment to be specified is made by the relevant Healthcare professional following assessments by the supplier's expert. The Charity acts solely as a funding facilitator, responding to the expert opinion provided.

2021 has been a typical year during which we have funded trikes from four suppliers: 21 from Quest88, 14 from Theraplay, and 1 each from Tomcat and Jiraffe. Each trike starts with the selection of a model range and frame size, together with all the adaptations needed to suit the specific requirements of the child. Each manufacturer's design varies slightly, and a final decision is then made on which trike can best be adapted to the specific needs of the child.

We receive reports back from families on the subsequent progress, and in addition to providing essential exercise and building muscle strength, there have been reports of major improvements in mobility after use including helping some children to start walking.

Costs for the trikes shown vary from £1,250.00 to £2,350.00, depending on model, supplier, the exact specification, the level of any funding raised by the family, and our agreed discount structure with the individual supplier.

7.5	5117.00	He has a diagnosis of Ohtahara syndrome and other medical problems. He requires 24 hour care and needs Oxygen and tube feeding. The Charity negotiated a discount, paid the total cost and received co-fund contributions of £1,500 from the NHS Trust, and £1,000 from another charity towards the total amount required.				
13	1500.00	He has a diagnosis of Duchenne Muscular Dystrophy, and required a comfortable seat system to hold him securely and fully support his hips. Although the NHS would supple chair, the single type they specify was found to be unsuitable, and eventually a suitable seating system was found, with the correct support, but required funding by the famil With a total cost of £3,813.00, it was part funded by a GoFundMe webpage, and we agreed to fund the balance required.				
5	623.13	She has a diagnosis of Smith Magenis Syndrome, and has no awareness of danger. She regularly releases herself from her buggy straps and a secure harness system was required. She was assessed by Windmill Special Needs and we agreed to fund the proposed magnetic safety harness.				
15	429.00	She has a diagnosis of Leber's Congenital Amaurosis which means that she has very little sight and attends a visually impaired school, where she is progressing well. We had helped her before with computer equipment, but she urgently needed to replace her Apple iPad. This had the necessary apps to allow her to use it extensively for all her studies, and it's loss was causing her great difficulties. Knowing the family and the case we agreed to fully fund.				
7	2315.80	He has a diagnosis of Lissencephaly, global development delay, epilepsy, poor coordination and low muscle strength. He has no communication, is fully dependent on adult care and uses a wheelchair buggy. He needed a standing frame for home use as he has been working on intensive daily physiotherapy to improve his leg muscles, his balance and his limited mobility. Without regular use of a standing frame (which he has at school) the improvements made would regress. With another charity contributing £800.00, we agreed to fund the balance required.				
7.5	701.15	He has a diagnosis of West syndrome and severe learning difficulties. He required special support seating to enable him to sit at a table, and a Breezi chair was specified which we agreed to fully fund.				
4.5	331.66	He has a diagnosis of Pontocerebellar Hypoplasia and a range of other problems which will be severely life limiting. He requires constant care which is provided by his mother during the day and by specialist carers at night. We funded a car seat some time ago which he has now outgrown, and he required a new seat which we agreed to fully fund.				
15	203.49	She has a diagnosis of Arcadia Goutieres Syndrome and requires a wheelchair and special postural support. She needed a tray to fit the wheelchair, which was not supplied by the NHS, and the provision of one was proposed, to help with all of her general daily activities. We agreed to fully fund.				



Fundraising in 2021

Another Year of major disruption caused by the COVID 19 Pandemic:

Fundraising was a real challenge in 2021, as many groups were unable to meet for parts of the year, and few fundraising events were possible. As a result, we do not have any detailed reports on activities held during the year. In total, we received just over £4,100.00 from events that were held, the bulk of that from a retirement party held by one of our supporters.

We received a surprise £600.00 collection from the Worcester Co-Op, and several families we had previously helped held collections for us, to enable us to continue our work. Two of these are ongoing and we are receiving funds (with a couple of month's delay), as donations are raised.

Despite the difficulties, we managed to exceed £100,000.00 raised and granted during the year, so that we were able to help every application in accordance with our Grant Criteria, and we can start 2022 with no Waiting List, and a small reserve.

One key area for our income has been our Regular Donors. We have now increased to 17 regular monthly contributors, and with Gift Aid (where applicable), this source raised approximately £9,500.00 during 2021. This was around 9% of the income for the year year, so it is now a major source of funding. With known increases in 2022 contributions, this will provide further increased income, and we would like to continue to grow this figure, if possible, to improve the stability of our income. Even at our minimum level of £2/month, this raises (with Gift Aid) £30.00 in a full year, so a few new supporters would be a great help.

Our donation pages at the end of this brochure (and in detail on the website) list the many other ways donations can be made to us. In particular, the opportunities with commission payments, when purchasing from Amazon for example, are an excellent zero cost option of raising funds for your chosen charity. Obviously we hope that you will have selected us, but the whole charity sector benefits at no cost to the purchaser, once you have signed up. Please have a look - you can initially register at https://smile.amazon.co.uk/ch/1101230-0 then log in at Smile.amazon.co.uk whenever you wish to make an Amazon purchase, as well as the many other options with Give as You Live. We now regularly have up to 5 or 6 people per day making Amazon purchases, from which we eventually benefit, and while individual commission payments are small (0.5% of the cost and paid by Amazon), these amounts do add up, and could provide a very significant source of income longer term.

Everyone can help us by recycling used printer cartridges. We are registered with Recycle4charity, and there is a list of the used cartridges that can be recycled on their website. The Charity can benefit by an average of around £1/used cartridge. There are no postal costs provided a sufficient number (listed on their website) are returned each time, and it is environmentally friendly.

Thank you for the help we received in 2021, it has been an exceptional year in passing the milestone of £1 Million raised and granted since we started.



The Organisation

We continue to run the organisation with four Trustees, who cover all the work necessary, and contribute any minor incidental expenses incurred, so that the Charity can operate with zero administration costs.

We are all in regular Email, Telephone and Zoom contact, which, as a small group, enables us to give a fast response to grant application requests that are in accordance with our grant criteria. We hold two formal meetings a year, where we complete a full six monthly review of the organisation, and we quickly assemble for any additional meetings, as necessary.

It is our intention to continue to operate with a fast response, and with zero administration costs to both meet the needs of those who apply to us for help, and the expectations for funding use of those who so kindly support us.





Funds Raised and Grants Made to Dec 31st 2021







2020 was a year where progress was restricted by the impact of the COVID 19 Pandemic, which greatly affected the assessments that could be carried out, and our fundraising income was also significantly reduced. 2021 also started under lockdown conditions, but once they were eased we saw increases in activity and the busiest Q3 we can remember, and a very busy Q4. We just managed to raise enough funding to cope, with the help of two very short periods when we introduced a Waiting List. 2021 has ended around our more normal level of activity.

The Extent of Grant Help Requested

Over the years we have analysed the grants that we make, and we find that there is a consistent pattern. The size of grant that we make does vary, but mindful of the need to spread our limited funds as widely as possible, we try to:

- Firstly, we look for any fundraising that might have occurred, which would reduce the total amount needed from the Charity for the purchase to proceed.
- Secondly, whether or not we can claim VAT Exemption (which is applicable in most cases
 on completion of the relevant paperwork) and is a very useful cost saving. This is the
 reason we ask for medical details of the applicant so that we can check if the application
 is exempt.
- Thirdly, although we take no part in specifying the supplier, where equipment is purchased regularly from a supplier, we look to both negotiate discounts, and improve those discounts when/if there are further increases in business.
- Finally, we fund the balance then required to proceed, which is often the full cost of purchase, but for very large requests, we try to help with co-funding with other charities to spread our limited funds further.

We monitor the size of the grants made, and we classify them as either "Small" - less than £1,000, or "Large" for those over £1,000.

The results over the years tend to be fairly consistent with a similar percentage of "Small" grants which shows that small sums (typically around £500 on average) directed to exactly where they are needed, do have a significant effect in helping a family in many cases.

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As can be seen from the figures above, on average approximately 54% of the total grants made each year are for less than £1,000, and this activity typically consumes around 26% of our expenditure, showing the importance of "Small" targeted grants to help a family. Typically also, the average grant size, of all the grants made in a year, has been relatively consistent, just falling back a little as the percentage of "Small" grants has increased in recent years.



Why is our charitable funding needed?

While the NHS and other Government organisations will provide a number of items of equipment for disabled children, with the inevitable funding constraints there are restrictions on the extent of help available, and with seemingly ever increasing demands on the system, the rules regarding what will be supplied are constantly tightening. The resultant unfunded need leads to requests for help, either directly from families, or via relevant healthcare professionals such as the Paediatric/Occupational Therapists working in the Children with Special Needs Departments of the local NHS Trusts, and from the Special Schools where constant tightening of budgets has led to increasing requests for help.

Typically, the equipment the Charity funds falls into these general categories:

- Exercise: Specifically to develop the necessary muscles and coordination to either improve independence in daily activities, or to slow a deterioration in current mobility.
 Typical equipment funded includes special exercise trikes, walkers, and standing frames
- **Special Seating:** For school or home use, to provide the correct postural support, and enable a child to fully participate in activities in either location.
- Comfort: Many of the cases helped involve severe mobility problems, often wheelchair bound, with the need to periodically change position, provide the correct postural support, and relieve pressure points. Equipment funded includes special comfortable support chairs, Acheeva beds, and special support seating systems. We also fund additional wheelchairs (often portable), powerpacks for manual wheelchairs and special buggies to enable children to be taken out safely, as well as the required buggy accessories (eg rain cover) as we find that if the NHS does fund a buggy, it rarely funds the accessories that are needed.
- Health and safety: Special car seats to provide the support a child may need, and special
 harnesses to hold them securely, as certain children would otherwise release themselves
 from their car seat and endanger driver safety. Also including any form of equipment
 specifically to hold a child safely and provide the correct postural support, as well as
 hoists and equipment to help with daily living needs.
- **Sensory:** We receive a number of requests for equipment to help to calm and control a range of behavioural problems, and provide quiet and safe areas.
- **Sleep:** Requests usually involve equipment specifically to hold a child in the correct position to avoid hip dislocations, and all types of special beds eg. profile beds, high sided cot beds and safety sleepers to provide the correct environment for sleep.
- Vision: All types of vision equipment to help registered blind children achieve their
 potential when the Vision Impairment Service is unable to obtain the necessary funding
 for the equipment required. We receive a number or requests from the Dudley Vision
 Impairment Service for a wide range of computer based equipment.
